Tiruchirapalli Multipurpose Social Service Society (TMSSS) was **established during the year 1975** for the promotion of justice, peace and development through integrated and integral human development initiatives and for establishing a just society. TMSSS has been registered as a Society under the Societies Registration Act of **1860 on 10.01.1975** under No.2/1975. Registration done under FCRA 1976 was renewed under the amended **Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act (FCRA) 2010** on 03.08.2016 **under the same No.076040030 and the registration is valid between 01.11.2016 and 30.10.2021.** Registered also under **section 12A** of the Income Tax Act 1961 on 22.04.1988.

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1. a. MULTI-DRUG RESISTANT TUBERCULOSIS

INTRODUCTION

TB is a top killer worldwide ranking alongside HIV/AIDS. A recent WHO report has ranked India with having the highest number of TB cases in the world, Union Health Minister J P Nadda, said recently.

TB is a public health scourge, a health security threat, and a development challenge. Active, drug-susceptible TB disease is treated with a standard 6 month course with 4 antimicrobial drugs that are provided with information, supervision and support to the patient by a health worker or trained volunteer called Dot provider. TB can be cured if medicines are provided and taken properly and regularly for the minimum stipulated period.

GOALS


Goals:

To decrease mortality and morbidity due to Tuberculosis and cut transmission of infection until TB ceases to be a major health problem.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND RESULTS

Sensitization Trainings:

- ✧ Those trainings enhanced our staff's individual and group leadership and managerial skills and also upgraded their talents to carry out the programmes efficiently.

Awareness programmes at schools:

- ✧ The students who participated and learned the messages shared in turn with other students and thereby enabled the message to reach everybody in the campus.

Awareness programmes at communities:

- ✧ As an outcome of our efforts the people have become knowledgeable about the shortcomings of patients and that understanding have created a positive impact both on the affected and the public.

Motivational campaigns:

- ✧ The TB affected patients learned the proper procedure of treatment how to overcome the side effects of medication & how to take care of their other children living with TB patients.

Counselling & Guidance sessions:

- ✧ Through our concurrent guidance the values of kindness and caring were fostered through which they got retrieved from their mental stress slowly

Distribution of nutritional support:

- ✧ The regular intake of this nutritional support have improved their health status and stamina which gave strength to work more, made them to look beautiful and improved their personality traits too.

Provision of additional treatment cost

- ✧ Since the TB affected people were economically very weak, the TMSSS supported 23 such vulnerable people to meet the medical costs for their other diseases.

As an innovative measure we have introduced Ayurvedic Medicine in addition to the regular Apathic medicines to the T.B. Patients because Ayurvedic medicines when given additionally the recovery rate has been proved to be faster. The Ayurvedic medicines improves the health status and the immune power. Initially we have introduced this new innovative method among 100 TB patients. The patients testified already that intake of Ayurvedic Medicines have relieved them from instant cold, congestion and breathing discomfort.

- ✳ As a result of additional support the health condition have improved to a great extent & the mortality rate also have become very much decreased.

Provision of Educational support

- ✳ Financial support to 20 students were given to meet the tuition fees, costs of notes & text books and uniform materials.
- ✳ This support enabled them to continue their education without drop in the middle. This had played a very good role in reducing the financial burden of their parents to a certain extent.

TMSSS observed World TB Day in a befitting manner on 24th March 2017 by organizing awareness programme for students of Sacred Heart Higher Secondary School, Ponmalaipatty and also conducting rally with the students.

CONCLUSION

TMSSS adapted a holistic strategy to address the challenge of TB, more so from the patient's perspective and through its multitude of activities involving the community and patients for TB control. The project had reached out to the population who required the TB services and will serve as an effective model for others to replicate.

1.b. COMMUNITY BASED HEALTH CENTRES

OBJECTIVE:

To alleviate the immediate sufferings of the rural poor and the less privileged without any discrimination on the basis of caste, religion etc.

ACTIVITY:

Since this programme is being run purely on charity basis the people are given free consultation, free medicines and drugs. Nominal fee is collected to conduct deliveries. The reach of the Health Centres during the year 2016-17 are: 13,904 patients and the details are given in the following table.

In addition to the above, the patients who needed specialized treatment and care are referred to other established hospitals with whom the TMSSS have already developed a good rapport and tie-up. Those hospitals provide the required treatment for the referred patients at concessional rates.

1.c. INTEGRATED REHABILITATION CENTRE FOR DRUG ADDICTS (IRCA)

TMSSS have established an Integrated Rehabilitation Centre for Drug Addicts under the scheme “Prevention of Alcoholism and substance (Drugs) abuse” at Keeranur, Pudukkottai district with 15 beds under the grant-in-aid of the Govt. of India Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment.

OBJECTIVES:

- ✳ To increase the public awareness regarding the hazards of drugs / alcohol addiction through outreach programmes.
- ✳ To prevent people from becoming addicts and victims to alcohol and other drugs.
- ✳ To rehabilitate alcohol / drug addicts and restore them to normal life and
- ✳ To provide social, psychological and economic support to the families of the addicts.




2a. DAY CARE CENTRE (CRECHES)

Day Care Centres are being run for the past 37 years with the grant-in-aid of the Government of India, Ministry of Women and Child Development through Central Social Welfare Board under Rajiv Gandhi National Creche Scheme with the following objectives in 16 places.

OBJECTIVES:

- To provide day care facilities for children of (6 months to 6 years) working mothers.
- To improve the nutrition and health status of the children.
- To promote physical, cognitive, social and emotional development of children.
- To educate and empower parents / care givers for better child care.

ACTIVITIES:

The scheme will provide an integrated package of the following services.

- Day care facilities including sleeping facilities.
- Early stimulation for children below 3 years and Pre-School Education for 3 to 6 years old children.
- Supplementary Nutrition
- Growth Monitoring
- Health Check-up and Immunization.

IMPACT:

- Children of 01 to 06 age group develop the habit of going to school
- Children learn good habits and some subjects
- The economic and psychological burdens of the working and ailing mothers become reduced.
- The physical, cognitive, social and emotional developments of children become upgraded
- The mothers and care givers become aware of child care procedures.

2.b. EDUCATION, CARE AND SUPPORT

FOR POOR BOYS AND GIRLS

Education, Institutional care and other material supports are being provided by Tiruchirapalli Diocese for poor boys and girls by establishing two homes viz. St. Joseph's Home for boys and Mother Theresa's Home for girls at Nazareth, Pudukottai district.

OBJECTIVES:

The basic objectives of the homes are:

- Enhancing the level of knowledge and skills of the boys and girls in academic subjects and in coping skills.
- Ensuring that the boys and girls have greater access to basic needs such as shelter, food, clothing and health care.
- Providing space for the boys and girls to cultivate and develop extracurricular and co-curricular activities for holistic development.
- Helping the boys and girls to identify their hidden talents and skills and provide them a platform to exhibit and foster them further.
- Enabling them to enjoy a good physical and mental health through sports and games activities.

CARE GIVEN IN ST. JOSEPH'S AND MOTHER THERESA HOMES DURING 2016-17:

- St. Joseph's home accommodated 60 boys and Mother Theresa's Home accommodated 35 girls. Among the inmates of both the homes, some are full orphans, some are semi-orphans (with one of the parents) and others are from vulnerable and economically very backward families.
- Both the boys and girls were provided food, shelter, personal needs, uniforms and casual dress materials, stationeries, etc., in those homes.
- Boys and girls were helped to study between V and XII Standards in the nearby St. Thomas Higher Secondary School, run and managed by the Roman Catholic Diocese of Tiruchirapalli.

2.c. REALMADRID SOCIAL SPORTS SCHOOLS

The TMSSS is running two Social Sports Schools viz. St. Thomas Social Sports School (St. Thomas & St. Patrick) from the year 2013 and R.C. Social Sports School (R.C. & Sacred Heart) from the year 2014 with the support of RealMadrid Foundation through City of Hope and Joy Foundation, Madrid, Spain. 400 students in those two Social Sports Schools (320 boys and 80 girls) are being trained in Football.

One more Social Sports School have been approved and it will bear the name “St. Joseph’s Social Sports School” (St. Joseph’s at Pothamettupatty and R.C. at Periya Anaikaraipatty). 200 students (120 boys and 80 girls) will be trained in Football from June 2017 onwards.

2.d. AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM FOR SLUM CHILDREN

After School programme for slum children are being run in 15 slums at Tiruchy to enable the school going children to improve their standard through proper guidance and under conducive learning environment since most of the slum houses are small and not properly lighted and ventilated.


Activities:

- Enrolment of children of school going age in the nearby schools.
- Prevention of drop outs and reduction of dropout rate.
- Ensuring that the children are not pushed to streets or begging or becoming victims of antisocial elements.
- Supplementing their school education through Evening Coaching Centres.
- Enhancement of their performance towards integrated development.
- Promotion of their latent talents by creating a plat form to exhibit.

2.e. SPECIAL SUMMER COURSE

In order to help the poor and needy students brief summer courses are being conducted through Kolping India Project. This year, we have conducted the SPECIAL SUMMER COURSE ON BASIC KNOWLEDGE OF COMPUTER, BASIC SPOKEN ENGLISH AND TAILORING in our Kolping Computer Training Centre, TMSSS, Trichy from 2nd May to 11th May 2017.

The Secretary Fr. Susai Alangaram and Director Fr. John Selvaraj gave the Felicitation address on the starting day. They explained about the need for Spoken English, Tailoring and Computer knowledge and their importance in improving their studies now and for future. There was a common panel discussion about their learning. They voiced out that, the course could be continued for another 15 or more days. The Students performed Role-play, Songs, and Conversation. There was a briefing about the Computer course by Mr. Martin, Spoken English by Mrs. Selvi and Tailoring by Mrs. Reeta Mary. The Coordinator Mr. A.Vincent Ugone had organized the program. Finally Certificates were issued to the students. In this Course 33 Students and 2 adults attended and benefitted.

3.a. NAMBIKKAIYAGAM- HOME FOR MR ADULTS

The Home for MR Adults between the age group of 14-25 is being run since the year 2008 with the grant-in-aid of the Commissionerate for the Welfare of the Differently abled, Govt. of Tamilnadu to identify and develop the hidden vocational skills so as to enable the MR Adults access to livelihood security. 53 MR Adults (29 males and 24 females) have been accommodated at the home during the year 2016-17.

MAJOR AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- Providing education and training to the mentally handicapped adults
- Providing composite care and suitable vocational training to mentally challenged
- Enhancing employability of the mentally challenged.
- Improving socialization process and acceptance
- Emphasizing the responsibility of parents and the extended families through counseling and motivation.
- Undertaking and encouraging scientific research works related to prevention of mental retardation.
- Developing public awareness on mental retardation.






MR Students Gender Wise Strength




Beneficiaries for Disability Wise




Beneficiaries for Disability Category Wise : IQ levels




Beneficiaries for religious wise

SUCCESS STORIES

1. Marriyayee



Marriyayee aged 16 is a moderately retarded girl from rural area near Trichy. When she was admitted into our home she was noticed to be without basic academic skills and socialization, and she did not know how to wear neatly and comb her hair properly. During the course of formation the special teacher identified her hidden talents in singing throw ball and academic skills. Due to continuous special training she had improved a lot in numbers and money concepts.

She is now able to spell Tamil letters and read the familiar names of the vegetables, fruits and animals.

In the beginning stage she was very reluctant to join in any competition. But now she has become courageous to appear on the stage and to participate in throw ball matches.

2. S. Russia



Russia is a 14 years old moderate level retarded girl student who came from Punjai Sankenthi from Lalgudi taluk area. When she entered into Nambikkaiyagam, she was very poor in communication and functional skills and with behavioural problems. (Stealing and unwanted fighting with peer groups). With the continuous training in behavioral thereby, yoga and meditation she has become very active now in Academic skills and other co-curricular activities.

In addition she had evinced interest in vocational trainings like greeting card preparations ornament jewels making, cooking related works and drawing. She is now very co-operative and accommodative with other students.

3.b. SWADHAR GREH - SHORT STAY HOME


To prevent women from exploitation and to support their survival and rehabilitation, the scheme of Short Stay Home for stranded women and girls was introduced as a social defence mechanism by the then Department of Social Welfare in 1969. Another scheme with the similar objective namely Swadhar- a scheme for women in difficult circumstances was launched by the Department of Women and Child Development in 2001-02. Since the evaluation conducted by the Centre for Market Research and Social Development, New Delhi in 2007 found out that the activities and the follow-up procedures are almost similar in both the schemes and hence recommended for the merger of these two schemes for better functioning and outcomes with lesser administrative burdens and procedures. Both the schemes were merged and the vision of the new scheme is.

VISION:

The scheme envisions a supportive institutional frame work for women victims of difficult circumstances so that they could lead their life with dignity and conviction. It envisages that shelter, food, clothing and health as well as economic and social security are assured for such women. It also envisions that the special needs of these women are properly taken care of and under no circumstances they should be left unattended or abandoned which could lead to their exploitation and desolation.


OBJECTIVES:

- To cater to the primary need of shelter, food, clothing, medical treatment and care of the women in distress and who are without any social and economic support.
- To enable them to regain their emotional strength that gets hampered due to their encounter with unfortunate circumstances.
- To provide them with legal aid and guidance to enable them to take steps for their readjustment in family / society.
- To rehabilitate them economically and emotionally.
- To act as a support system that understands and meets various requirements of women in distress and
- To enable them to start their life afresh with dignity and conviction.

Review meeting

The Director visits the home every month and reviews the work done and progress made during the month. The meetings are optimally used by the staff also to find / get solutions for their problems and difficulties.

Sub-committee meeting:

The sub-committee constituted with the staff of the programme, representatives from police department, social welfare department, ward, public etc., meet once in three months to review the problems faced and solved, progress made and future needs for improvement of the home.

3. c. SONTAM - INTEGRATED PROGRAM FOR STREET CHILDREN (OPEN SHELTER)

The TMSSS' SONTAM (Rehabilitation Home for Street Children) is executing two projects viz. open shelter and Reception unit for providing temporary care and protection for children brought from streets, bus stands, railway stations, market places, temples etc and for children referred by Child Welfare Committee respectively. These programmes are financially supported by the Govt. of India, Ministry of Women and child Development through the Department of Social Defence, Chennai and District Child Protection Office, Tiruchy.

Main activities of the open shelter:

1. **Contact of Street Children:** TMSSS have six contact points from where stranded children are picked up and brought to the home.
2. **Counselling:** With the help of professionally qualified counsellors they are counseled and enabled to spell out the reasons for their run away from homes and their immediate needs.
3. **Provision of shelter and care:** The street boys accommodated are provided safe and secured shelter with all the minimum required infrastructural facilities and nutritious food. Their health needs and personal needs also are attended adequately.
4. **Non formal Education:** The boys admitted are taught to read, write and to do some basic maths. They are also educated in discipline, personal hygiene, social values, basic ethics etc.,
5. **Vocational guidance and training:** To ensure the life of the eligible boys more self dependant and sustainable later they are given vocational guidance and training in the trade they like.
6. **Home Management Committee:** The Committee Members meet regularly to analyze the improvements of the children in every aspect and to suggest ways and means for further development of the children and the home.
7. **Awareness and Net work of volunteers:** Public meetings were organized in different places to generate an awareness about the pros and cons of the life of street children to be faced in their lives. In addition we have created a Net work of volunteers who educate, guide and find suitable placements for these vulnerable children.

Activities of the Reception Unit:


Under Reception Unit programme the children identified or referred or handed over or transferred from other Child Protection Homes are admitted into our home through the reference and request of the Child Welfare Committee. The same attention are given to them also through the above detailed activities. When they are accommodated for a temporary period providing all the opportunities at the directions of the Child Welfare Committee they are either rehabilitated with their parents or transferred to other established Child Protection Homes for further maintenance.






3.d. INFANT JESUS DAY CARE CENTRE FOR MR CHILDREN

Infant Jesus Day Care Centre for MR Children is being continued to run from the year 1997 with the financial support of Stitching Liliane Fonds - The Netherlands. At present 15 MR children are being cared for at the home at Sangiliyandapuram, Trichy.

Aim:

Supporting Children with Disabilities to maximize their physical and mental abilities to access regular services and thereby to become active contributors to their family and society at large.



In addition to the provision of basic human needs like food recreation and periodical medical attention they are involved in yoga and meditation and the parents and care takers are given awareness and orientation.

The Parents' meetings were also organized every month to keep apprised of their children's learning progress, adaptability and socialization with other children.

Achievements and Results :

- The CWDs are showing good improvements and developments both physically and emotionally through our services.

- The parents & relatives of CWDs had already started taking initiatives to attend to the basic and minor problem of other pregnant women and lactating mothers in their neighbourhood as a result of our interaction.
- Since the CWD's parents have learned all the therapies and training methods they have started to reduce their dependence on the professionals

We are happy to hear the following statement frequently from parents that my child had shown some improvements and much better than before.

This is the only tonic that makes us to work enthusiastically in the field of disability.

SUCCESS STORY

J. MOHAMMED RIYAZ, 7 Years, CP with MR

The child was initially identified by Ms. Gnanam, ORW during her field visit at Kattur.

Child before our efforts:

The child had no neck control, expressed his needs only through crying and he was not able to sit since he did not have hip control

After proper medical assessment, IEP was made for him in all the domains of CBR concept.

Progression / Result:

- Now listens to the sound and music and able to sit and watch TV for a short time
- He also smiles at all his family members and able track moving the toys/objects.


The grandparents and parents are very happy on seeing his improvements and very thankful to TMSSS.

3.e. COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION

Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) focuses on enhancing the quality of life for people with disabilities and their families, meeting their basic needs and ensuring their involvement and participation. CBR is a multi-sectoral approach and has 5 major components: *Health, Education, Livelihood, Social and Empowerment*. CBR is a strategy for rehabilitation, equalization of opportunity, poverty reduction and social inclusion of people with disabilities.

AIM OF THE PROJECT:

Empowering Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) by eliminating social discrimination and building capacities to access socio-cultural and economic resources and support so as to lead a life with human dignity and self respect.



Achievements & Results:

- ❖ The CWDs are showing good improvements and developments both physically and emotionally through our services rendered
- ❖ The panchayat leaders and SHG members had realized and appreciated our activities by witnessing the CWDs drastic change and further requested us to continue our services for the welfare and development of their vulnerable disabled children.
- ❖ The illiterate people of our target community who became aware of the life style of special children referred the special children whom they identified.
- ❖ The parents & relatives of CWDs had already started taking initiatives to attend the basic and minor problem of other pregnant women and lactating mothers in their neighbourhood as a result of our interaction with them.
- ❖ The community leaders graciously allowed and supported us in using all the local resources like manpower to organize and collect people to explain about the disability in public meetings.
- ❖ The school authorities cooperated and co-ordinated in every respect to impart the required awareness on disability and its prevention to the students.
- ❖ As all the parents of our target area regularly attended the meetings and have discussed about their children's problems, interventions and achievements they are able to take follow-up measures without our intervention.
- ❖ The authorities and leaders of the communities have been lobbied to arrange to provide loans from banks & SHGs for Income Generation Programme and to get aids and appliances required especially motorized vehicles for the needy people from DDAWO to move around independently etc.

Conclusion

Since we are able to implement all the activities in collaboration and support of Government sectors for the welfare of the CWDs they are being enabled to become self reliant and to live with human dignity as any other normal persons in the society.

SUCCESS STORY

S. KARTHIKEYAN, 7 Years, CP with MR

Karthikeyan was brought to our centre by his mother as her elder sister after knowing the services of TMSSS for such vulnerable children.

Condition when identified:

- The child was born at the eighth month and there was no birth cry at all.
- The boy was not able to sit, walk and even to crawl even after 2 years.
- He was in lying position the whole time.

After the continuous motivation and instigation of the Out Reach Worker the child was taken to a Neurologist for diagnosis and assessment.

Improvement:

As a result of the continuous workout of all therapies under CBR domain the following improvements have been realized.

- Abled to crawl in knees and crab things, get up from lying position partly and say words like Father, Mother, Grandmother, Baby, Dog etc.
- Abled to identify parents in person and from photos.
- Abled to name and differentiate colours, write the words when dictated, number in order and separate things by shapes.
- Abled to identify fruits, vegetables, vehicles from pictures and inform mother when toileting need arises.

Parents' feedback:

The parents are very delighted and happy to see their son's improvement in many fields. They said that they are confident of their son's future and development as a person.

3.f. ARTIFICIAL LIMBS FITMENT CENTRE

The Artificial Limbs Fitment Centre (ALFC) is being run by TMSSS since the year 1989. The Govt. of India, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment provided grant-in-aid from 1994 upto the year 2011-12. Thereafter the centre is being run from local resources but however Renewal applications for grant-in-aid are being submitted to the Ministry every year.

OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAMME :

- To facilitate the alternatively abled to cope up with the mainstream of the society by enhancing their mobility.
- To identify and assess the treatment services required by individuals.
- To produce aids and appliances appropriate to the needs of the alternatively abled persons.
- To make the rural poor children and adults with disability to access the required mobility appliances.
- To sensitize the public on prevention of disability and protection of body parts.

3.g. PHYSIOTHERAPY TREATMENT CENTRE

The Physiotherapy Treatment Centre started during the year 1989 by TMSSS with its own resources continued to get grant-in-aid from Govt. of India, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment from 1st March 2000 under Deendayal Disabled Rehabilitation Scheme.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- Identification and Examination of PWDs.
- Providing Physiotherapy and Occupational therapy treatments.
- Training for the PWDs with special appliances.
- Attending the identified PWDs at their doorsteps.
- Conducting camps, seminars, special counselling for the parents and caretakers of the PWDs to provide awareness, preventive measures and guidelines etc.

Facilitating maximum independence in performance skills and improve functional efficiency in day -to-day work.

Services in our centre

Physiotherapy

Physical therapy or physiotherapy (often abbreviated as PT) (also known as Movement Science) is a [Rehabilitation](#) profession that remediates impairments and promotes mobility, function, and quality of life through examination, diagnosis, prognosis, and physical intervention using Physical agents, mechanical force, adaptive devices, and movements. In addition to clinical practice, other activities encompassed in the physical therapy profession include research, education, consultation, and administration. In many settings, physical therapy services may be provided alongside, or in conjunction with, other [medical](#) services.

Occupational therapy

It is an activity-oriented treatment, which uses purposeful activities that have an inherent goal, relevant and meaningful to the patient.

The important goal of Occupational therapy is to facilitate the development of maximum function essential for adaptation and productivity, to diminish or correct pathology and to promote and maintain health.

Occupational therapists work to restore functionality of the patients in their work places besides restoring functional efficiency in day to day work.





4.a. DELAYED MARKETING CENTRES

TMSSS runs and maintains three Delayed Marketing Centres at 1) Keeranur from 1993, 2) Manjampatty (Manaparai) from 1994 and 3) Nazareth from 1998 to support the small and marginal farmers of the respective areas without any discrimination.

Objectives:

- ✱ To eliminate the exploitation of middlemen, traders and money lenders
- ✱ To enable the poor farmers get fair and competitive price for their products.
- ✱ To facilitate the farmers to play due role in fixing up the prices for their products.
- ✱ To help the farmers to keep their products in a safe and secured place until they are able to sell at reasonable price.
- ✱ To orient and encourage the farmers to have direct linkages with marketing firms / agencies and thereby minimize middlemen intervention and exploitation.

Activities of the DMCs during 2016-17:

- Facilitated the small and marginal farmers of the said three areas to store their products safe in our godowns and sell them when the prices are high.
- All the farmers were provided an advance of Rs. 10,000/- each at 8% interest to meet their immediate financial needs.
- 20 paise per kilogram day was collected as rent for the products stored in the godowns.
- The rent and interest so collected are used to maintain the godowns and to pay the care takers.



4.b. AGRICULTURAL TRAINING CENTRE (ATC)

The Agricultural Training Centre established by TMSSS during the year 1983 in 75 acres of land at Nazareth, Pudukkottai district with adequate infrastructural facilities like Cottages, Halls, Guest Rooms, Chappel, Staff quarters, sheds for livestock are being managed and maintained properly and wisely used.

The boys of St. Joseph's home are being accommodated in the cottages, the staff quarters are being occupied by wardens and service providers, the sheds are being used for the live stocks like Cows, Calfs, Goats and Chickens to stay, the guest rooms to house the Spanish Volunteers, the Chappel for prayer services and the halls for study, meetings, recreation, cultural programmes, trainings etc., The Kolping India project and Mahalir Membattu Iyakkam (MMI) makes the best use of the hall for their training purposes.

The 75 acres of land in ATC has 4 open wells, 3 Bore wells and 2 percolation tanks. Only 3 acres are being used for cultivation due to shortage of water for irrigation. In addition the centre accommodates and breeds 57 goats, 10 cows with calves, 10 chickens and 02 Dugs.

5.a. SURABI MAHALIR MEMBATTU IYAKKAM (MMI)


The Mahalir Membattu Iyakkam (MMI) that started to function from 1987 was registered as a society during 2009 under the name SURABI - Society for Development.

The goal of SURABI-MMI is to organize and empower women groups and lead them towards self dependant and sustainable living in their socio-economic domains.


The new thrust of the year 2016-17 was to increase the memberships and to network with the other groups to solve the issues that affect women in the communities.





5.b. KOLPING INDIA PROJECT

With the main thrust of building *A BETTER TOMORROW*, Kolping Program is actively implemented to nurture the Humanity among the rural poor with proper livelihood, economic stability and on the whole, to foster self esteem and self sustainability. The Kolping India Movement has been implementing its programs from 1989 as a part of TMSSS programs for the spiritual formation and for enhancing the livelihood of its members through economical and social development.

This year we made a move to another field namely **TWINNING PROJECT**. To make the movement more effective with various **TARGET** people and activities, we concentrated more on forming groups among the Differently Abled, Tribal communities, and Children. We are proud to say that with the initiatives of Kolping staff and Kolping Board Members we have expanded our groups and reached the target of 1215 members in 69 groups in three vicariates of the Diocese. Among them 14 new groups with 261 members (vulnerable groups 6 with 117members) have been formed this year. The group savings stands around 86 lakh now. The diagram shows the growth of groups and its memberships.

I. CAPACITY BUILDING SEMINAR & TRAINING PROGRAMMES


Our main task is to make the groups alive and active to work for a social change, economic stability and above all, to bring out self-reliance among the Kolping members. To realize the above, we have conducted Capacity Building trainings supported by IKS Germany through Kolping India, Chennai to facilitate them to become self-dependant and sustainable for their individual and family needs.

The trainings conducted are:

- Trainings on EDP, MF, Book keeping, Motivation, OAP, Right based, Leadership skills.

New trainings conducted this year are:

- Awareness creation on the theme of “ Sanitation for all”
- Awareness creation on Family values regarding alcoholism, geriatric and Marital conflicts and awareness creation on HIV/AIDS Prevention and care



II. INCOME GENERATION PROGRAMME :

We focused to insist on self reliance among Kolping members to grow individually and collectively through economic activities like IGP and CIGP. They revolved their own savings for their own developmental and emergent needs. Apart from their own savings the income generation activities ventured by Kolping India and TMSSS for the members to increase their individual and family income are:

Tea and petty shops, cloth (Saree) sales, grinding flour, Tailoring & embroidery; goat rearing, Candle making and cosmetics, production of Masala and Nutrition powder, grocery shops, fish, fruits and vegetable vending, making of phenyl, pickle, pappadam, cleaning and washing powder, Wood Carving and electrical workshop

This year we gave CIGP loan to St. Antony's Kolping Family, Thondamanpet to start Garment Making and to establish an outlet for sale. This CIGP is running profitably and plays as a good model to other group members.

The monetary assistance extended during the year from International Kolping Society (IKS) Germany through Kolping India Chennai towards enhancing the member families' living conditions are:

IV. SANITATION RALLIES:

On the eve of the **“WORLD HEALTH DAY”**, The Trichy Regional Kolping conducted “Health Awareness Rally” on the 7th April 2016 at Karungulam.

Around 350 School children, Teachers and 190 Kolping Members from 12 Kolping groups and DLKF leaders from our region participated in this program.

On the eve of the **“WORLD TOILET DAY”**, The Trichy Regional Kolping conducted “Health Awareness Rally” on the 19th November 2016 at Ayyampatty.

Around 250 School children, Teachers and 150 Kolping Members from 7 Kolping groups and DLKF leaders from our region participated in this program.

V. ENTERING INTO THE VULNERABLE SECTION THROUGH TWINNING PROJECT:

The objective of the New Twinning Project : Poor and marginalized strata of society in South India are socially, economically and politically empowered and engaged actively in the positive development of their communities and social structures.

We entered into the villages where there were lots of vulnerable communities. In the initial stage we concentrated on the Tribals, Dalits, Physically challenged, Visually impaired and children. There are many practical barriers in these villages like socio, economic, political and cultural.

There are many people living remotely who do not have easy access to any facilities particularly health and economic facilities. They don't have any permanent job. They have to find out their daily job opportunities, and they are not socially accepted. The main social stigma is they have to depend on others for their needs. Sometimes they are degraded and differentiated from the community. Their basic needs are denied by the Govt. nor delayed to get fulfilled.

We have formed 8 groups for these communities in three areas. Now the following basic formation and training activities are going on.

Data Collection, Formation, Training on Kolping Values and ideologies, Training on savings and credit, Training on Book keeping and Documentation, Loan distribution for IGP and Sanitation and Federation.

VI. NOTABLE OUTCOMES / IMPACTS:

- ❖ The new entry to the Twinning project is a new experience
- ❖ New groups formed among the vulnerable communities
- ❖ Sustainability Creation is going on, New initiatives of IGP activities have emerged.
- ❖ The standard of living, Self Confidence and Self respect of the downtrodden and vulnerable communities proved vital progress.

VII. CONCLUSION:

After a long time we have entered into the new effort of concentrating more on the vulnerable communities. In the present situation, it is a challenge to these people to enter into our Kolping Movement. But their interest through their participation and involvement in the Kolping Programs and Trainings, proved that, there can be possible improvements in their Socio - Economic development activities. Thus our aim of adhering to the principles and the vision of the founder Bl. Adolph Kolping in providing "Better Tomorrow" for all the deserving and particularly the families of vulnerable communities are being realized gradually.

5. c. ST. MARY'S WORKING WOMEN HOSTEL

The Central Social Welfare Board, New Delhi financially supported for the construction of the Working Women's Hostel during the year 1987 and since then the Hostel is being run and maintained to provide safe and secured boarding and lodging facilities for the out stationed working women who are job placed in and around Tiruchy and for postgraduate and professional course students if they couldn't find place in their respective institutions.

OBJECTIVES:

- To provide safe and secured boarding and lodging facilities to stay and live for the time being.
- To empower each and every inmates to be united in team spirit.
- To provide other required and appropriate facilities.
- To make their stay pleasant, comfortable, homely and thereby facilitate their work and studies become undisturbed.

ACTIVITIES:

- During the year 2016-17 working women numbering 59 and 120 students were provided safe and secured accommodation.
- All the inmates were given food three times a day at nominal cost under dividing system.
On 10th October 2016 Aayutha Pooja / Saraswathi Pooja celebrated.
On 19th December 2016 Christmas Day celebrated.
On 14th January 2017 Pongal Festival Celebrated.
- To mark solidarity Saraswathi Pooja, Diwali, Christmas, Pongal etc., were celebrated. Those celebrations enabled the inmates to become united and feel as one family.

Manifestations / Testimonials:

1. My name is Ramya still unmarried. We are five children living with our mother and my father is no more. At this juncture it has become my responsibility to care everybody at home. Since I am working for a small salary in a computer centre I was forced to search a hostel which will be cheap and safe. I found St. Mary's Working Women's Hostel to be the best.

I feel happy to live with others as in a family with good relationship. I am fully satisfied with the hostel accommodation and food as they are good, safe, tasty and cheaper than other hostels in the town. The hostel life have taught me several experiences like simplicity, sincerity, punctuality and flexibility. Very many thanks to the Administration.



- I am very grateful to the administration for facilitating me to live homely as in my home.




BENEFICIARIES STRENGTH WISE




RELIGIONWISE DETAILS OF BENEFICIARIES
